Dissertation Abstract: The dissertation aims to make sense of philosophical issues that arise from the so-called “loss of control” that occurs in mental disorder. First, I develop a model of the sense of agency that can explain how individuals with anorexia nervosa can sincerely experience their disordered actions as being effortful and within their full control when this is not the case. Then, I propose a “horseshoe model” of loss of control that accurately captures the complex web of similarities and dissimilarities between disorders marked by extreme rigidity (e.g., anorexia) and extreme impulsivity (e.g., addiction). Finally, I pursue a question that arises out of the horseshoe model, namely: Why is one “half” of the model associated with the phenomenology of loss of control while the other “half” is associated with the phenomenology of extreme self-control? This line of inquiry ultimately leads to an understanding of how actions flowing from one’s pathological desires can be accompanied by drastically different phenomenology depending on the contents of one’s self-image.
